

last summer. Each of those badges equals 10 learning activities a child and a caring adult did together. What better way could there be to ensure kids have the best chance of success when they start school?

What about the older kids? The 6-11-year-olds read a total of 4,209 hours. And the teens read 2,530 hours. No summer slide learning loss for them! And our adult participants read a total of 3,176 hours. Who loves summer now?




Dive Into Summer Programs

Another popular fundraising event are the Friends biannual book sales, these are hosted in the Library community room and allow patrons to purchase an entire bag of books at a tremendous discount. Friends members also provide volunteer services to the Library during particularly busy programs, such as the summer kick off carnival and Grinchmas. Last and certainly not least the

Friends of the Library board pursues grants and other such opportunities to raise funds on the Library's behalf. A great example of

this is our ongoing Family Fare/ SpartanNash grant which helps raise funds for the Library Maker Space and S.T.E.A.M. programs. The Library Foundation is an organization dedicated to accomplishing long term and large scale projects for the Library. These include the purchase of the Arcaide


